YOUTH EMPLOYMENT

■ <u>Aberdeen Guarantees</u> was launched by Aberdeen City Council and partners including Skills Development Scotland (SDS), North East Scotland College, Aberdeen & Grampian Chamber of Commerce and Scottish Council for Development & Industry. They make a commitment to provide all 14–25 year-olds with learning, training and job opportunities.

Similar schemes include **The Edinburgh Guarantee**. (24)

- RNIB Scotland was awarded £516k Big Lottery
 Investing in Communities funding for Looking to the Future,
 a three-year project to help blind and partially sighted 15–25
 year-olds move into work or further education. (25)
- University of Stirling researchers published <u>Childhood</u> <u>psychological distress and youth unemployment</u>. Findings suggest that 'children who experience emotional problems are at high risk of unemployment in early adulthood', particularly during times of recession. Children rated 'highly distressed' were 40% more likely to experience youth unemployment. 26

SKILLS & THE WORKFORCE

- UK Commission for Employment & Skills (UKCES) launched a 'progression and pathways in retail and hospitality' competition, the third in its UK Futures

 Programme for employers. Proposals are sought for a share of £2m to pilot innovative ways of improving earnings and progression of low paid workers. (25)
- Institution of Engineering & Technology published Engineering & Technology Skills & Demand in Industry 2014, a survey of 400 employers across the UK. Findings include:
- Only 6% of engineers, and 3% of engineering technicians are women.
- 23% of employers said they do nothing at all to improve workforce diversity. (26)
- Scottish Informatics & Computer Science Alliance launched a 12-month focus on Supporting & Recruiting Women in Computing. It aims to address the shortage of female applicants to computer science programmes in universities, the often 'poor ratio' of female to male academics, and shortage of women in promoted posts. (26)
- Youth Scotland, Stirling Council and MXP Training Centre are piloting a four-day health and fitness employability and leadership skills programme for young men not in education, employment or training. (25)

CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

- Scottish Business in the Community (SBC) published The Responsible Business Journey for Scotland, setting out a 'vision for an inclusive future'. It calls for business to take a clearer role in addressing issues, including:
- tackling poverty and addressing inequality
- improving education and employability for young people and disadvantaged groups.

A timely reminder of the role and importance of business contributing to its community, with mutual, tangible and broad benefits. (24)

Government & Wider Society

SOCIAL EXCLUSION & MOBILITY

- The UK **Social Mobility & Child Poverty Commission** published *State of the Nation 2014 Report*. It calls for:
- government to commit to ending long-term youth unemployment by 2020
- half of all larger workplaces to offer quality apprenticeships
- the attainment gap between disadvantaged and better off children to be closed
- teachers to be offered greater financial incentives to teach in deprived areas
- universities and employers to ensure they recruit from a broader range of talent
- unpaid internships to be made illegal
- 5,000 more pupils from a free school meals background to be going to university by 2020.

In a <u>speech</u> in Edinburgh, Alan Milburn, Chair of the Commission, explored the role of education in 'unlocking more social mobility in Scotland'. (25)

■ Joseph Rowntree Foundation (JRF) published Monitoring Poverty and Social Exclusion 2014 across the UK. The number of people unemployed, or unemployed for over a year, or working part-time but wanting a full-time job, were all lower than in 2013. However, household incomes and wages have fallen across the board. (26)

In May 2014 JRF published the research report Closing the attainment gap in Scottish Education.

LITERACY

■ A UK-wide **Read On. Get On.** campaign was launched in Scotland by a coalition led by **Save the Children Scotland**. A <u>report</u> sets out the 'mission' to ensure all children are reading well by the time they start secondary school. The ultimate aim is to 'help children escape poverty'. (26)

Further & Higher Education

STUDENTS

- **Equality Challenge Unit** published <u>Equality in colleges in</u> Scotland: Statistical report 2014. Findings include:
- There were 297,585 students in 2012/13, down from 489,610 in 2007/8; under 16s, 35–39s and 40+ age groups more than halved.
- 14.2% declared a disability (up from 13.7% in 2011/12); 40.4% at SCQF Level 3, 14.4% at Level 4 and 8.6% at Level 7.
- 88.7% of UK students were 'UK white', 6.3% 'other white', 2.7% Asian, 1.3% black.
- 52.4% of students were female, 67.1% on non-vocational courses with no recognised qualification.
- 65.1% of students at SVQ Level 3 were male. (24)
- **Scottish Funding Council** (**SFC**) published <u>Measures</u> of Success: Learning for All; for 2012–13, a report on their strategy for widening participation. Progress is 'incremental', with universities 'some way from achieving patterns of participation' that match the wider population.
- 29.0% of university entrants were from the 40% most deprived areas (up from 28.6% in 2011–12).
- 3,469 students articulated from college to university (up from 3.019).
- Proportions of entrants with a disability or from an ethnic minority background increased.
- The gender gap remained broadly static, and very prevalent in some subjects.
- The proportion of young entrants rose while the proportion of mature entrants fell.
- Retention rates improved for all students.

Universities Scotland <u>noted</u> the 'vast attainment gap between the richest and poorest pupils' for Highers and Advanced Highers, and called for 'a life-cycle approach' from early years upwards. (26)

In an <u>Informed Scotland</u> guest blog, Helen Thorne, Director of Policy & Research at **UCAS**, comments on the 'persistent' gender gap. (25)

This needs to be more than a conference, it needs to be a step towards substantive progress in changing outcomes for young people born into poverty. We've talked long enough.

COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

- Equality Challenge Unit published <u>The rationale for</u> equality and diversity: How vice-chancellors and principals are leading change, based on interviews with 12 UK university principals including **Abertay**. It provides an insight into personal motivations and institutional drivers and benefits of championing this agenda. (25)
- University of the Highlands & Islands launched a crowd funded <u>Scholarship Fund</u>, the first in Scotland. Companies and individuals are being asked for donations to support students who need financial help. (24)
- Articulation agreements, with the aim of widening access to higher education, were signed between:
- North East Scotland College and University of Aberdeen; college students on 12 HND courses will be able to gain advanced entry to degree programmes.
- Glasgow Caledonian University (GCU) and Glasgow Kelvin College, building on existing collaboration. GCU also has an agreement with City of Glasgow College and plans another with Glasgow Clyde. (26)
- University of the West of Scotland (UWS) is to create the Ayr Campus Volunteering Academy with £50k Moffat Charitable Trust funding, led by UWS School of Business & Enterprise. The Academy aims to improve employability of UWS students and unemployed Ayrshire residents. (26) UWS launched a Volunteering Academy in Hamilton in May.

Community & Adult Learning

SKILLS & TRAINING

- The EU <u>Learning for Work and Life! One Step Up</u>

 <u>Project</u> published a new <u>Learning to Learn toolkit</u> to support training providers working with 'marginalised and disadvantaged' groups. The learning approaches can be used to develop a range of skills including adult literacy, ICT, problem solving and working with others. 26
- Bauer Academy launched 'Be Somebody', fully funded media skills training for 15–25 year-olds across Scotland. Supported by £63k Creative Scotland Cashback for Creativity funding, 50% of places will be given to YouthLink Scotland to involve young people who do not traditionally access media training or the arts. The project will deliver industry skills and encourage participants to get involved with community groups. (26)

Schools

EDUCATION & SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

- Association of Directors of Education Scotland published *A 2020 Vision for Education*. It suggests that Scotland 'lacks true integration of local and national improvement agencies', and calls for a 'more agile' model to 'improve attainment and close the inequality gap'. (26)
- Robert Owen Centre for Educational Change
 published The School Improvement Partnership
 Programme: Final evaluation, commissioned by Education
 Scotland. The programme was set up to tackle
 'educational inequality' through collaborative working in
 different, innovative ways. Findings from the first phase in
 2013–14 suggest good progress is being made. (26)

PARENTS & FAMILIES

- The National Parent Forum Scotland published Learning Pathways in the Senior Phase and Beyond, the latest in their Nutshell series. It aims to help parents understand the options available to pupils from S4. (25)
- The Scottish Government launched a new **Engaging** with Families website providing access to research and evidence of effective strategies. It is mainly focused on vulnerable and deprived families with the aim of raising educational attainment and achievement. (24)
- **SDS** launched a new My World of Work for parents website. It provides information on courses, jobs and careers to help parents support their children. (24)

Informed Scotland

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MENTORING & RAISING ASPIRATIONS

- Fife Council and University of St Andrews set up a new mentoring programme to help 'looked after' young people progress to further or higher education. University students will mentor 20 S4 and S5 pupils either in or coming out of care. (25)
- Children's University (CU) Scotland is launching a new Dundee CU, with funding from Abertay and Dundee Universities and support from Dundee & Angus College. It aims to help 5–14 year-olds raise their aspirations and boost achievement.

Two other CUs were launched with **Strathclyde** and **Queen Margaret Universities** in 2013. (26)

SUPPORT FOR VULNERABLE LEARNERS

- Education Scotland published <u>Supporting Learners:</u>
 <u>Children & Young People from Service Families</u>. These pupils 'may face barriers to their learning including interrupted education and social and emotional needs'. (24)
- University of Edinburgh research, funded by the Nuffield Foundation, looked at the educational achievement of 540 pupils in Scotland aged 16 with a degree of hearing loss. Pupils with any level of deafness were below the average academic score for the general population. Academic achievement of pupils with only mild hearing loss was no better than profoundly deaf children, suggesting the former 'are being overlooked in schools'. (26)
